METRO's Equity Mentorship Program

Finding Strength in Solidarity

Welcome!

We're so excited to announce our Equity Mentorship Program! This program will take place from October 2022 through June 2023, with Zoom classes concluding in December 2022 and a scholarship for additional continuing education available to be used through June 2023. This opportunity is open to currently enrolled BIPOC library science and archives students, as well as early professionals within the first three years of their careers. Program Scholarship: \$2,000 for any library, archives or leadership-related conference, course, or professional development event. This will need to be used by June 23rd, 2023.

Program Objective

This program is meant to support BIPOC students and early professionals in the library and archives field. Our intention is to create a curriculum that will aid BIPOC in their careers, while creating an opportunity for collaboration, community, networking, and mentorship.

A cohort of five participants will be selected through an application process. They will submit a 500-750 word letter of intent, their resume and 2 academic or professional letters of recommendation. Selected participants will meet biweekly in an online Zoom "classroom" for 120 minutes (2 hours) from October to December 2022. Each session will be guided by a professional in the field and will focus on a relevant topic. METRO will host six classes total.

Participants will be required to attend each class, engage with the material, submit a 250-500 word reflection piece to METRO staff within one week after each session, and prepare a final project due to METRO by Monday, December 19th, 2022. We will record each session for students to refer back to for those who may have to miss a class due to personal reasons.

Each student will complete a final project as part of this opportunity. Potential projects include:

- The creation of an online slides based Zoom presentation on an educational topic relating to course material. Topics must be approved in advance by METRO staff and the presentation must take place before Monday, December 19th, 2022.
 - This presentation will be listed on the metro.org website and available for the public to attend
 - A recording of the presentation will be made available on METRO's public YouTube channel
- Writing a 1,500-word essay that focuses on subject matter covered during the program.
 Topics must be approved in advance by METRO staff and due by Monday, December 19th, 2022 by midnight.
- Volunteering with a community-based organization for 8 to 10 hours before the
 program's finish date on Monday, December 19th 2022. Participants must organize their
 volunteer placement and gain approval from METRO before starting and provide a letter
 from the organization by Monday, December 19th, 2022.

After the in-session classes have concluded, students will be encouraged to attend a library, archives, or leadership-related conference or professional development event. They will be offered a scholarship of up to \$2,000 to pursue this, and will have until June 2023 to engage with continued learning as a part of this program.

Eligible expenses include conference/event registration costs, housing, \$75 per diem for food (alcoholic beverages are not an eligible expense) and transportation. If childcare is a concern, please email Traci Mark (tmark@metro.org) with info@metro.org copied to schedule a meeting to discuss costs to cover this while participants are engaged in continuing education.

What Program Participants Can Expect

Participants welcomed to the program can expect a dynamic experience where they will gain knowledge and insights that will help them thrive in their careers in the field. Our coursework aims to address skills that we believe are necessary to facilitate a healthy workplace environment and personal wellbeing while at work. We will teach skills that will support students

and professionals in advocating for themselves and the projects they care about. We hope to foster a sense of community and knowledge-sharing within the program cohort.

Each student in the program will receive:

- A recording of each class. These recordings will be provided exclusively to cohort members and are not to be shared with others
- A written handout of main points from each class
- A scholarship of up to \$2,000 to attend a library, archives or leadership-related conference to be expended by June 23, 2023

Eligibility

You are welcome to apply for this program if you:

- Are enrolled in an MLIS OR have graduated from such a program within the past three years
- Have three or fewer years of experience as a credentialed librarian or archivist
- Identify as a Black person, Indigenous person, or other person of color

This program is open to all individuals who identify with the list above. Special preference will be given to applicants who live or work in New York City or Westchester County.

FAQ

Who is this for?

This program is designed for people who identify as BIPOC and are either:

- MLIS students or those who have graduated from such a program within the last three years.
- Early professionals (three years or fewer)

How long is the program?

The in-class elements of this program will be three months total, with participants meeting on a bi-weekly basis. At the conclusion of coursework, participants will receive a scholarship of up to \$2,000 to attend a library, archives or leadership-related conference, course, or professional development event. Participants will select an educational experience that meets their needs and interests and must notify METRO Staff of their selection. METRO reserves the right to refrain from supporting any institutions, events, or courses that in any way violate our Code of Conduct and Equity Statements.

How many students/early professionals will be admitted?

Five total

Who is eligible for this program?

- Those who are enrolled in an MLIS OR have graduated from such a program within the past three years
- Have three or fewer years of experience as a credentialed librarian or archivist
- Identify as a Black person, Indigenous person, or other person of color

How often will the group meet?

The group will meet every other week. This program will hold bi-weekly classes with an assignment due one week after class concludes

When are the classes?

Class will be held bi-weekly on Fridays from 9 am to 11 am. Each class will be 120 minutes.

What assignments will be required of participants?

Participants will be required to attend each class, engage with the material, submit a 250-500 word reflection piece to METRO staff one week after each session, and prepare a final project due to METRO by Monday, December 19th, 2022. Potential project types are listed above, and we encourage creativity in the final project you'd like to do for this program. Surprise us!

What expenses will be reimbursed in the scholarship that's part of this program?

Eligible expenses include conference/event registration costs, housing, \$75 per diem for food (alcoholic beverages are not an eligible expense) and transportation. If childcare is a concern, please email Traci Mark (tmark@metro.org) with info@metro.org copied to schedule a meeting to discuss costs to cover this while participants are engaged in continuing education.

How can I apply?

You can apply for the program by providing your CV or resume, two letters of recommendation—they can be professional, academic, or one of each—and a 500-700 word letter of intent that describes what you hope to gain from the program.

When will interviews take place?

Interviews will be conducted via Zoom on Wednesday August 24th, Thursday August 25th, Wednesday Sept 7th, Thursday September 8th, Friday September 9th, Tuesday September 13th and Wednesday September 14th. We will contact selected applicants to choose the time and date that works best for them. Interviews will be no longer than 30 minutes.

When can I expect to be notified?

We will notify applicants if they're selected for the program during the week of Monday, September 19th. We will also notify those who are not selected for this cycle.
